Focus – History

Some facts about The Great Fire of London:

- Samuel Pepys wrote a diary, it is one of the main ways we have learnt about the Great Fire of London.
- The Great Fire of London happened between 2nd and 5th September in 1666.
- The fire began in a bakery on Pudding Lane, lasted four days and burned down over 13,000 homes.
- Many houses were made from wood and straw.
- People used leather buckets, metal hooks and water squirters to put out the fire.
- Sir Christopher Wren designed a monument to remember the Great Fire of London.
- When houses were rebuilt, a lot of them were made with bricks instead of wood.
