

Focus – The Stone Age

Some facts about The Stone Age:

- 15,000 BC to 2,500 BC
- The Stone Age began 4 million years ago when the first humans lived in Africa
- The first people arrived in Britain 700,000 years ago
- The Stone Age ended around 4,000 BC when people discovered how to make copper and bronze (the Bronze Age)
- Our ancestors painted on the caves of France and Spain about 30,000 years ago.
- Modern humans (Homo Sapiens) first appeared 300,000 years ago.
- Homo Habilis was an early human that lived around 2 million years ago. It is believed that these were the first people to use stone tools.
- The Orkney Islands in Scotland have the oldest known stone houses, they are 5,500 years old and are still standing.
- Cave paintings were made using charcoal, coloured stones, plants and animal gums ground down into paint.
- The Stone Age is split into three parts; Palaeolithic Period (Old Stone Age), Mesolithic Period (middle Stone Age) and the Neolithic Period (the new Stone Age).
- The wolf was domesticated into dogs in the Mesolithis Age to help hunt and ward off danger.
