

What's going on this week?

A study from the University of Valencia, in Spain, found that print reading could boost skills by six to eight times more than digital reading, for example, on an e-reader or tablet. The study, published in the Review of Educational Research, also found that while there is a negative relationship between digital reading and comprehension for primary school pupils, the relationship turns positive for secondary school-aged pupils.

Teaching Tips and Ideas



Starting your Picture News Symbols lesson

- Start by looking at the poster, talk through what the children can see, what they like or dislike about the picture and what they think the story might be about.
- Talk through what is happening in this week's story. Use the questions to encourage children to share what they enjoy reading and whether they prefer to read printed books or read books on screens.
- Use the emotions page to discuss how the story makes them feel.

Taking the lesson further

- This week's picture resource shows different things people can read.
- Discuss the pictures that show some of the things people can read and encourage them to think of other things. Which do they or members of their family read often?

This week's sensory ideas

- Provide a range of different reading materials (cereal boxes, children's magazines, recipe books, newspapers, leaflets) for the children to explore. Which do they enjoy reading/listening to/looking at, and which do they not like very much?
- Over the week, enjoy a range of stories in different ways such as audio, on big screen, a physical book. Which do the children prefer?
